



Super Neighborhood 14 at Work in a Bustling, Dynamic City

Sidewalk improvements are happening in Harris County Precinct 4. The improvements started in Lazybrook up near 610 in 2022 and have worked their way south to Timbergrove Manor. The items being accomplished with the sidewalk improvement project include repairing existing hazardous sidewalks and street panels and creating ADA ramps at the corners.

Only neighborhood streets are part of this project, not major thoroughfares. They marked the target sidewalks by orange arrows before starting





repairs. The target completion date for this project is summer of 2023, finishing around Sinclair after the school year ends. If you notice an issue while they are working in your area, you can request the crew or foreman to assist with your issue.







West 11th and 18th Streets are having street panels replaced by the City of Houston where they are significantly damaged. Undoubtedly, you have seen the traffic cones and rerouting on West 11th at some point. They are also extending the shared use path extended from Bryce to Shirkmere.

TIRZ12 has completed a drainage study. On February 8, a public meeting was held. At the meeting, the TIRZ12 proposed spending \$76 million for underground retention and conveyance


along major thoroughfares. Five phases of construction have been proposed: 12th St., Seamist, 11th St., Ella Blvd, and Grovewood. After this, the estimated flooded structures from 100-year storm decrease from 347 to 303 Structures if no changes are made to White Oak Bayou.





The City of Houston is in the midst of drainage improvements on the **Turkey Gully** west bank. Along with this, curbs and gutters along Bevis and 20th street are also being improved. There is a proposal to build a roundabout at TC Jester where it meets 18th and 20th Streets, which would be estimated to be completed in 2024.

TIRZ5 and the Houston Parks and Recreation Department are working together to renovate Little Thicket Park, which is just on the other side of White Oak Bayou from Lazybrook. The plan includes some trails deep into the woods which may provide interesting creature encounters once they are completed. One million dollars have been allocated for a new playground, trails, exercise stations, bike racks, and a resurfaced basketball court. Currently, this project is in the design phase with a target completion in the first quarter of 2024.

Transportation Grant Applications are not yet approved, but preliminary applications were submitted on January 27. If any of the applications are selected, the full application will be due in June. TIRZ5 submitted an application for a West 11th Street Trail Extension to construct the remainder of a 10ft wide 11th Street shared use path from Durham to Ella. Harris County Precinct 4 has submitted to construct 10ft wide shared use paths through CenterPoint Easements providing off-street pedestrian access to Sinclair and Jaycee Park.



TIRZ5 is also still in the works of proposing a Transportation Study to evaluate needs and options for Greater Heights area.

Why are you asking if my child is snoring?

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Protect Your Money with these ATM & Debit Card Safety Tips

Using your ATM or debit card is a simple, hassle-free way to get cash, make deposits, check account balance, transfer funds, make purchases and more. To enjoy the many conveniences electronic banking offers, you should make ATM and debit card safety a priority. Start by treating your card like cash and storing your card in a safe place.

Treat your card like cash.

Always store your card in a safe place and don't leave it in your car where it can be stolen.

Keep your PIN a secret.

ATM transactions and PIN debit purchases require the use of a secret code known as a personal identification number, or PIN. Memorize your PIN, and never write it on your card, or store it with your card. Never let someone else enter your PIN for you.

ATM

Do not disclose information about your card over the telephone.

No company or individual needs to know your PIN...not even your financial institution. If you perform transactions over the telephone using your ATM or debit card, never disclose your PIN.

Never disclose information about your card in response to an unsolicited e-mail or request.

E-mail is a common channel for fraud perpetration. Never provide your debit or credit card number, PIN, or any other non-public personal information to any entity in response to an unsolicited e-mail or request. Your financial institution will never ask you for your PIN.

Make certain your Internet shopping sites are secure.

Look for secure transaction symbols when shopping online to ensure your account information is protective. Always log off from any site after you make a purchase. If you can't log off, shut down your browser to prevent unauthorized access to your account information.

Protect your card's magnetic stripe.

Do not expose your card's magnetic stripe to magnetic objects. Magnetic objects can damage your card.

Report a lost or stolen card at once.

Immediately call your financial institution if your card is lost or stolen to reduce the chance that it will be used improperly. Immediate notice of lost or stolen cards will also limit your potential liability for unauthorized transactions.

Review your account statements for unauthorized transactions.

Review all account statements for your financial institution promptly, and report any errors (including transactions you believe may be unauthorized) as soon as possible. Prompt notification will limit your potential liability.

ATM Safety

Observe ATM surrounds before conducting a transaction.

If anyone or anything appears to be suspicious, leave the area at once. If you drive to an ATM, park as close as possible to the terminal. Observe the entire area from the safety of your car before getting out. If an ATM is obstructed from view or poorly lit, go to another location. If possible, report the problem to the ATM operator or your financial institution.

Minimize time spent at the ATM when conducting a transaction.

Have your card out and ready to use. Do not allow a stranger to assist you in making a transaction, even if you have trouble or your card gets stuck. When your transaction is complete, put your card, money and receipt away and immediately leave the area. Never count your money while at the ATM.

Only enter your PIN once for a transaction.

If you are prompted to enter your PIN twice, or if you notice unusual messages on the screen, notify the ATM operator or your financial institution. However, if there is a time out or if the transaction is canceled and you enter your PIN a second time, make note of the date, location and amount. Check your statement to be sure the transaction does not appear twice.

Block the view of others when using an ATM.

Stand between the ATM and anyone waiting to use the terminal. Shield the keypad as necessary when entering your PIN and transaction amount.

Look for possible fraudulent devices attached to an ATM.

If the ATM appears to have any attachments or alteration to the card slot or keypad, do not use the terminal. If possible, report the problem to the ATM operator or your financial institution.

Drive-Up ATM Safety

- » Keep your doors locked, with windows up and engine running when in line at a drive-up ATM.
- » Always leave enough room between vehicles to allow for a quick exit should it become necessary.
- » Before rolling down the window to use the ATM, observe the entire area.
- » Minimize the time spent at the ATM.
- » If anyone or anything appears suspicious, cancel your transaction and drive away at once.
- » If anyone follows you after making an ATM transaction, drive immediately to a crowded, well-lit area and call the police.

PIN Debit Safety

- » Never allow the cashier or any other person to enter your PIN for you, even if they are assisting you with the transaction. Always keep your PIN a secret.
- » Block the view of others when using a PIN debit terminal.
- » Be certain the transaction is complete and review your receipt before leaving.
- » If you receive cash back from a transaction, put it away before leaving.
- When using an outdoor terminal such as at a gas station, always observe your surroundings before making a transaction.
- » When using an outdoor terminal, if anyone or anything appears to be suspicious, leave the area at once.
- » It is a good idea to take another person with you when using an outdoor PIN debit terminal at night.
- » If anyone follows you after conducting a PIN debit transaction, proceed immediately to a well-lit area and call the police.



The Lorraine Cherry Nature Preserve News

You might not realize it, but during the winter months, the nature preserve is alive with activity. And, while it can be chilly on winter days, the trees of the forest block the wind and the temperature is nicely refreshing in the forest for our avian friends.

Our winter resident birds arrived in late November and have been regularly spotted. Both the Ruby-crowned and the Golden-crowned Kinglets, often flying with the Blue-gray Gnatcatcher, have made our forest part of their regular winter pattern while they were in Houston for the winter. Also seen regularly are the Blue-headed Vireo, the Orange-crowned Warbler, the Hermit Thrush, and, surprisingly, the Eastern Phoebe. And, although they are year round residents in Houston, the Great Horned and Eastern Screech Owls are fairly often heard at dusk during the winter months at the nature preserve. Some of these birds will not be here in the summer. It's very nice to have them visit and remind us that every season is worth celebrating at the nature preserve.

Many of our plants and trees inside the forest have gone into dormancy during the winter months. While we have gotten some much needed rain to refresh our flora as well as our fauna, the trees are on their own cycle which is highly affected by the length of days and nights. Here in Houston, we are in the northern hemisphere and experience a cycle of longer days in the summer and shorter days in the winter. That's the cycle our plant life follows. Our trees lose their leaves in the fall giving us our beautiful leaf litter. While we are anxiously awaiting the spring green leaf buds, the trees are busy being dormant.

If you want to read a little more about the value and cycle of tree dormancy, American Forest's <u>The Legend of Sleepy Trees</u> is a good introduction to what trees are really doing behind the scenes during dormancy and how it benefits the trees.

In the meantime, once the deciduous trees and bushes have lost their leaves and entered their period of dormancy, the forest feels different. It's as if you were wearing a raincoat, and took it off to bare your arms. There is more air fluttering about, more sunshine reaching through. The clover and moss all turn green as soon as the winter rains are over because there is more sun to feed the photosynthetic properties of the ground cover. You can actually look up and see the blue sky above unhindered. And, because it's winter in Houston, you are not hot, just joyful at seeing the clear blue of the sky and the warmth of the sun.

And, keeping in line with celebrating our trees, on February 9, a group of volunteers met with HPARD and helped to plant 3000 new saplings of 35 different species in the forest in near perfect weather conditions. These new, native trees will help to enhance the forested area, improve the diversity of the understory, and promote future canopy regeneration. It was very exciting to have so many planted at once, the first time that a native tree enhancement has ever been introduced to the forest. Some of the species that were planted which we've never had before in the forest are: Sweet Bay Magnolia, Mexican Plum, Red Buckeye, Common Persimmon, Southern Magnolia, Buttonbush, Pecan, Drummond Red Maple, and Swamp Chestnut among others. It was truly an honor to be able to participate with the Sapling Planting Day and it will be a privilege to see these new little saplings grow up and mature through the years.

Solid Waste Schedule

Tree Waste:

"Tree Waste" is defined as "clean" wood waste such as tree limbs, branches, and stumps. Lumber, furniture, and treated wood are not accepted during tree waste collection times, nor are items that fall into the "junk waste" category. Tree waste should be not confused with lawn clippings, which are collected weekly when bagged properly. The next tree waste collection will be on:

- Wednesday, March 15

Junk Waste/Heavy Trash:

"Junk Waste" is defined as furniture, appliances, and other bulky material. Tree waste is also accepted during junk waste months. The next junk waste collection will be on:

- Wednesday, April 19

Tires:

Residents may place up to four tires at the curb for collection during junk waste months. Collection crews will separate the tires from the junk waste. It may take up to a week before crews return and retrieve the tires.

Please be courteous and refrain from putting out your tree and junk waste too far ahead of the collection dates.

Recycling - Every other week:

- Thursday, March 16
- Thursday, March 30
- Thursday, April 13
- Thursday, April 27

Trash & lawn clippings are collected each Thursday.
