BROUGHT TO YOU BY HEIGHTS PEDO ORTHO

When should I take my baby to the dentist for the first time?

The AAPD (American Academy of Pediatric Dentistry) recommends establishing a "dental home" for your child within 6 months of eruption of the first tooth, but no later than at one year of age. This first visit is very important as it not only establishes a place you can call for emergencies and questions, but it also will guide parents through the important stage of development as the teeth first come in.

What will be done during this first appointment?

At Smiles For Kids we call these appointments our Well Baby Checks. They take about 30 minutes and much of it is spent on talking about proper brushing techniques, diet, teething, habits such as pacifier and thumb sucking, development of teeth, any dental conditions, and the role of baby teeth. Your little one will also have his or her teeth brushed by Dr. Lindhorst, she will do full dental exam and answer any questions you may have. Most importantly, with these 6 month visits, your little one will get used to coming to the dentist and by the time they are three, we will have a brave little patient ready for big cleaning and possibly x-rays!

Who You Gonna Call?

The Security Team will be having their first meeting of 2022 on Thursday, March 10th at 6:30 pm at Jaycee Park. We will be welcoming new members and discussing new ideas for 2022.

It has happened to too many of us. Something happens to us or our property and we just don't know what to do. Someone has broken into our car, taken all our wheels and tires, stolen our tailgate, removed the tools from the truck bed, stolen our mail, etc.

The Timbergrove Manor Civic Club Security Team will be working to provide more tips in the future on how to reduce your chances of being a victim. But first we want to help with tips on how to address an issue if it does happen to you. Contacting Houston Police Houston Police uses the crime reports as one means to determine how many officers to place in different parts of the city. We would ask you to report every crime you see no matter how big or small.

9-1-1 is for Emergencies only. Examples could include:

- A thief is currently in the act stealing something or another crime is ongoing. Call 9-1-1
- If someone is seriously injured, having a heart attack or a similar urgent medical issue and you can't safely help them get to the emergency room. Call 9-1.1.

Non-Emergency HPD number: 713-884-3131

This number is used when you need to make a report about a Theft or Property Damage that has previously occurred and is under \$5000.

Examples:

- Coming home to a previously occurring home burglary
- Finding a burglary/theft of a motor vehicle incident in the morning but from the night prior.

Online

You can also make a crime report online about a Theft or Property Damage, under \$5000 after the thief is gone or the crime has previously occurred.

The Timbergrove Manor Civic Club Security Team is working for you to provide more tips on how to reduce your chances of being a victim.

1. Turn on your exterior lights. - front porch, back patio, and sides of the house

Keep your porch light on at night. Lights are a great deterrent to thieves. They look for the dark spaces and hide in the shadows. Turning on your lights helps to keep them away. Lights on timers and motion sensors help ensure the lights come on when needed.

2. Get to know your neighbors. Front, back and side.

Neighbors watching out for neighbors is another good deterrent to thieves. Let your neighbors know when you are leaving town and they can help watch out for strangers while you are away. They can pick up your mail and papers, park in your drive way and many other ways to help it look like you are home.

If it looks suspicious check with your neighbor then report it. Knowing your neighbors can help. A watchful neighborhood is harder to steal from and it is one of the best deterrents available to us. If you see something, say something. Good neighbors can make all the difference.

3. Home alarms and cameras

Lock your doors and windows when you aren't using them. Thieves avoid houses with alarms and cameras. Cameras catch them in the act and help the authorities with convictions. Don't forget to add any unattached buildings to your alarm system. There are many companies today offering alarms with free cameras.

4. Park your cars in the garage and driveway whenever possible.

Thieves are looking for easy things. Vehicles in the street are easier than those near the house. Vehicle catalytic converters are easy to cut off with a saw but it's loud. It's Too loud to saw near the house as it could wake up the owners. If you must park in the street, park as close to the curb as possible and turn your front wheels as far as you can. This makes it harder to remove the lug nuts that holds the wheel to your vehicle.

5. Vehicle Alarms

Vehicle alarms help deter the theft of the car. Alarms with vibration and tilt sensors also deter vehicles from being jacked up (to steal the rims) and things being cut off.

6. Support the Timbergrove Citizens Patrol Team

The team is driving around at different times of the day and at night helping to keep the neighborhood safe. You can support them by waving as they drive by and reporting things you think are suspicious. If something looks suspicious, report it by calling the Houston Police Department Non-Emergency number (713) 884-3131, or going online and submitting an Alert Slip, as previously mentioned.

Volunteers Leading the Way

Early in 2021, after two years of behind-the-scenes push and pull with the City, and with help from our council member, Abbie Kamin, and the blessing of Houston City Council, a group of local volunteers from Timbergrove Manor Civic Club, Timbergrove Manor Neighborhood Association, Lazybrook Civic Club, and Super Neighborhood 14 were able to accomplish a big task.

Led by the commitment of four key residents of TMCC and TMNA, the whole group successfully championed for 18 concrete street panel sections to be replaced (not repaired) along W. 18th Street, east-bound, between Loop 610 West and Seamist Drive. This is considered Phase I of the project.

Recently, this same group, along with the new president of Lazybrook Civic Club, submitted a request for Phase II to continue street panel replacements from Seamist Drive to Ella Blvd on the east-bound side of W. 18th Street.

This same group requested Phase III of the street panel replacement project to address a terrible section of W. 11th street between Shelterwood and Bryce on the west-bound side, and that project is scheduled to be completed this year!

These accomplishments happen not only because the volunteers work hard, but they happen because they work together. TMCC, TMNA, LCC, and SN14 all want the same thing: to work for the greater good of our neighborhoods and residents. That's because they are residents here themselves.

In fact, the street panel replacement project is just one of several initiatives in recent years that have received attention and priority from City officials because of our neighbors' and civic club members' relentless activity. These include odor-reducing equipment improvements at Bryce Chemical Feed Station on W. 11th Street; the conversion of Overmeyer Street from one-way to two-way to improve traffic flow in the area; the responsible development of the Ella-Grovewood residential project; and ongoing traffic studies to address truck traffic and speeding in Section 5.

Our civic clubs give our volunteers the ability to connect with and hear their neighbors' concerns, and then work to connect with other local entities to make a difference in the neighborhood.

Our city leaders are also residents of our neighborhoods and are dedicated to working for our city. However, our local civic club volunteers can help guide city leaders to know exactly what needs to be addressed and where. Right now, we are all very concerned about continued commercial and residential development in the neighborhood and how that impacts our infrastructure. Did you know that there is a study in the works to find out where to make repairs to our storm water system because TMCC, TMNA, LCC, and SN14 all worked together to get that study going? These concerns won't just fix themselves, nor will our busy city leaders and council members just show up and start repairing things. They need our local volunteers to alert them to these problems.

We are very thankful to Councilmember Abbie Kamin and her staff, as well as the folks at Public Works for their dedication to these projects. The good work they do is invaluable to our projects.

But, you also can be a part of these important projects! Or, maybe you have a project that you feel needs to be brought to the table. The first step is to become a member of the Timbergrove Manor Civic Club. Then, go one step further—become a volunteer in TMCC. That's the way it all starts, and that's the way we can all make a difference together. There is room for you at the table, and TMCC is the way to find your seat.

Remembering Melvalene Cohen



Longtime Timbergrove Manor resident Melvalene Cohen passed away on January 10, 2022, at the age of 98. Mrs. Cohen is remembered lovingly by her family and friends in Houston, having given much of her time and talent to our community over the decades.

She and her husband Carl W. Cohen opened Studewood Food Market at 830 Studewood in the Heights in the 1950s. They later co-founded the Houston Heights Association in 1973. Mrs. Cohen also served on the Houston Arts Commission and was instrumental in procuring the Lombard Lamp, which shines brightly on the Carl and Melvalene Cohen Plaza, located at 11th Street and Heights Boulevard.

Mrs. Cohen was an active member of the Houston Heights Woman's club and the Floradora Club. The TMCC wishes her family well and is thankful to neighbors like Melvalene who make our neighborhood such a wonderful place to live.

I, along with the rest of The Friends of Lorraine Cherry Nature Preserve Board Members, would like to thank Jim Chambers for his leadership and vision as President of the Friends Group during the past two years.

Additionally, we recently welcomed Timbergrove resident Christ Riley as a new Board Member. Wally Ward continues as Vice president, Jennifer Vickers continues as Treasurer, and Pete Davies continues as Secretary. Michelle Colvard, Robert Delgado, and Brett Sillers will remain Board members of the Friends group. We are looking forward to a great year together.

Bird Walks in the Forest

Bird Walks in the Forest are happening this spring until the end of May at Lorraine Cherry Nature Preserve! Meet at the kiosk on Shelterwood, near the corner of Pineshade every Tuesday morning at 8:00 a.m. and thefirst Thursday of the Month at 5:30 p.m. (March 3, April 7 & May 5). Bird Walks in the Forest run from September through May yearly.

This past fall, Lorraine Cherry Nature Preserve became a partner park with Houston Audubon. Our Bird Walks in the Forest were already a special time to see birds and experience the forest, but are now listed as an official Houston Audubon Bird Survey. I and all of the other Bird Survey Leaders just completed a training with Houston Audubon. This meant we got a chance to meet one another and chat about our parks while we chased some birds together!

The fact that our park is now a Bird Survey is really exciting because it's community science in action. Each time we take a Bird Walk in the Forest, I enter all of the birds that we saw on an app called Ebird, as do all of the other Bird Survey Leaders all across the globe. Then, the folks at Cornell University compile the information together yearly, tracking bird locations and population numbers.

Spring Migration is Headed Our Way

We are so fortunate to live on what is called a Migration Flyway. Birds migrate from north to south yearly during the fall, and south to north yearly during the spring in search of theirfavorite temperature to eat, sing, and nest. We are in just the perfect spot when birds migrate northward. Believe it or not, birds fly over the Gulf of Mexico in one shot in the spring. There is no place for them to land, so when they get here from South America, they are not only exhausted, but they are hungry! They land in Galveston first, and then they head northward, spying Lorraine Cherry Nature Preserve from the sky, seeking food and rest. You really never know what we will see in the park in the month of April, the height of spring migration in Houston.



As a former Latin teacher, I love translation I thought I might translate a couple of birding concepts that you will hear about during migration.

Fall Out - Fall Out is when the birds migrate across the Gulf of Mexico facing a northerly wind. Ounce for ounce, just crossing the Gulf of Mexico is a huge challenge to the birds.But, add a northerly wind, and it's just plain exhausting! They will literally "fall out" of the sky to sleep and ravenously eat. You will sometimes see the most amazing birds just sleeping on the ground or in a tree near you. If you hear the words "Fall Out" on the news, get to the nearest forest and look for birds!

Lights Out for Birds - I know. Living in the city, we all think of lights on for safety. But, during fall and spring migration, for the birds' sake, it is lights out for safety. Birds have, well, bird brains, and they get confused when they are flying if they see lights on at night. They will fly right towards them and might accidentally commit suicide crashing into windows in buildings or houses. So, when migration hits, you will hear various people ask for "Lights Out for Birds." City street lights will not be turned out, but some of the buildings downtown will turn lights out. It is also an ask for you to turn your porch light off (but keep your cameras on!) for a week or so as the birds migrate through.

I'm looking forward to seeing you in the park soon!



Is Security in Timbergrove a Concern for You?

Keeping our neighborhood secure is high on many people's minds today. It is a concern for me and most of my neighbors. The Houston Police Department is committed to keeping Houston secure, but they need our help too.

One factor in keeping our neighborhood safe is the Timbergrove Manor Citizens Patrol Team. Several of your neighbors have joined the Citizen Patrol team to keep a security focused watch over our community.

The Citizen Patrol Team is established to provide a means for our community to help reduce the crime our community is facing by patrolling the neighborhood and reporting things that we see. Your Citizen Patrol Team are the additional eyes our neighbors and the police can rely on to help keep our neighborhood a safe place to live and work. We work to provide an effective team to discourage neighborhood crimes and promote a friendly and safer neighborhood.



Things NOT to Do When Putting Your Home on the Market

Don't over-improve.
